IN THE BOOKS Activity

WHAT YOU NEED: Board books about Jesus

WHAT YOU DO: Sit together and look at board books about Jesus. Talk about all the amazing things He did.

WHAT YOU SAY: "Come sit with me. Look at all these books! All of these books talk about a very special person! They talk about Jesus and the amazing things He did. Let's look for Jesus. There He is! *(Talk about the miracles Jesus performed.)* We can believe in Jesus because people knew Him and wrote down all the things He did. They told us all about Him. We can read about Him in the Bible."

RIDE Activity

WHAT YOU NEED: Toddler push cars and or a ride-on toy

WHAT YOU SAY: "Let's go for a ride! We can pretend to go anywhere! Let's start riding.

WHAT YOU DO: Enjoy playing cars with your children. Talk to them about other ways people can get places.

TRAVEL Activity

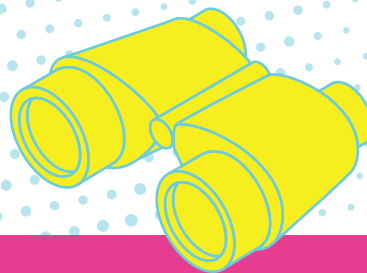
WHAT YOU NEED: A printed copy of the Memory Verse Handmotions.pdf with pictures cut out.

What You Do:

- Have the children stand in front you.
- Ask the children to hold out their arms straight out to the side and fly like a plane. When the children stop flying, say the memory verse to them. Repeat activity but offer new modes of travel for children to act out. driving a car, riding a train, rowing a boat, pedaling a bike etc.. After each pretend action, invite the children to say the memory verse again.
- Repeat it in chunks, or hold up each square of the memory verse.

AFTER THE RIDE AND OR TRAVEL ACTIVITY:

What You Say: "That was so much fun! In our Bible story, we heard about someone who went to different places to tell people about Jesus. We can tell people about Jesus too!"

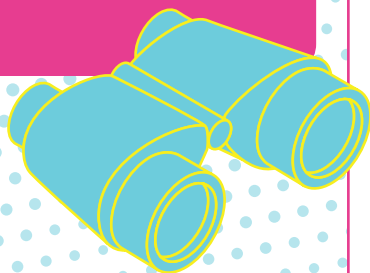

Paper, crayons

WHAT YOU DO:

Use the crayons to draw a sun on one piece of paper and a moon and stars on the other piece of paper. When you hold up the sun picture, everyone should dance. When you hold up the moon picture, everyone should pretend to sleep. Flip back and forth between the two pictures as your family dances and pretends to sleep.

WHAT YOU SAY:

"In our Bible story, we learned that Paul traveled to cities to tell people Jesus is alive. Paul knew that nothing is more important than Jesus! Lots and lots of people came to hear what Paul had to say about Jesus. He would start talking about Jesus when the sun came up early in the morning and keep talking about Jesus until the sun went down and the moon came up late at night

"Paul told the people about Jesus so that they could believe in Him. We can believe in Him, too. **Who can believe in Jesus? I can believe in Jesus.**"

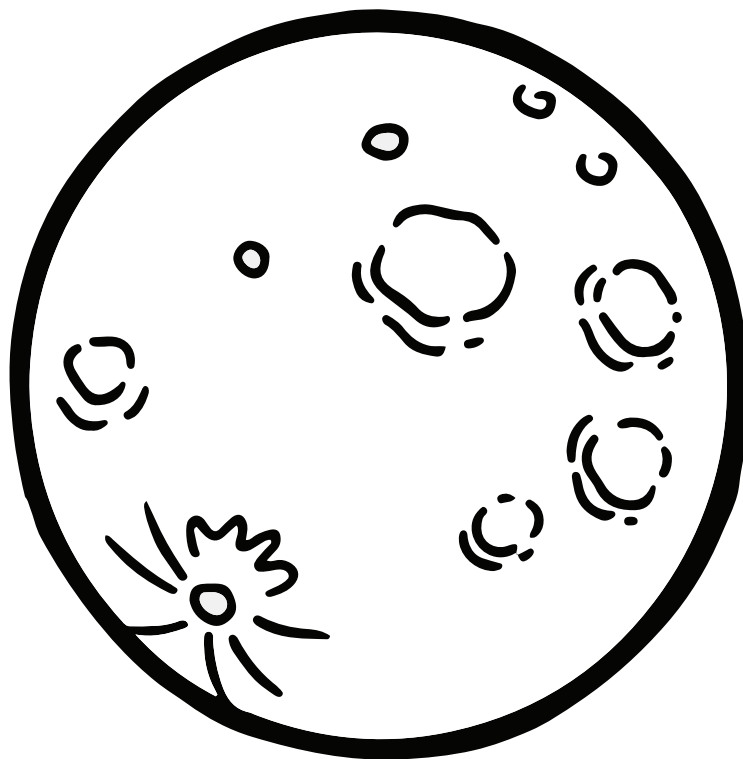
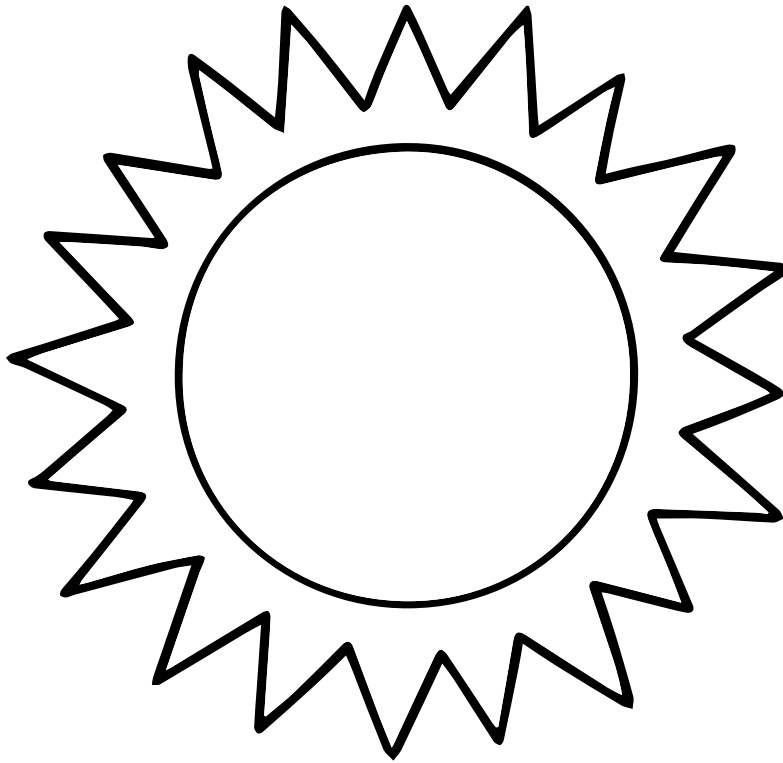
ACTIVITY: NIGHT AND DAY

BE OKAY WITH SAYING, "I DON'T KNOW"

As parents, we all know how much kids love to ask questions, many of which start with the word, "Why." These questions may start out simple: "Why is the sky blue?" or "Why can't I have another piece of cake?"

But when it comes to developing a child's faith, soon enough, these questions will progress to something more challenging. Questions like "Why do bad things happen?" or "Why does it feel like God doesn't care?"

We can't avoid questions. They are part of the human experience. Like it or not, that means questions will also be part of a growing personal faith. We can't ignore them or sweep them under a rug, hoping they'll disappear. At the same time, we can't string pithy phrases together and assume we're helping someone answer their deepest faith questions.

After all . . .

Not all questions have simple answers. Not all questions HAVE answers. No single human knows all there is to know about God and how God works.

While there is much we can discover about God, often the best answer for some questions is, "I don't know." This can be difficult parents, because we have this idea that leading kids means having all the answers to be able to help them with their questions or doubts.

When a hard question comes up, what if we were honest and said, "I don't know"? I read recently about the power of that phrase. Throughout history, saying "I don't know" and admitting ignorance has been the catalyst for discovery. Because people asked questions, humans learned, explored, and made progress that propelled history and faith forward—a process that continues still.

What if we could turn our shared ignorance into shared discovery? What if we said, "I don't know, but let's try and find out together." Or "People have all sorts of opinions about this, let's see which seem most wise to follow."

Taking the time to help our kids explore their faith is one of the most important things we can do for them. And while in the process of discovery, we may not find the answers we wanted or we may find that a question can't be answered yet, but we may also discover bigger ideas about God that help us trust Him even more.

So when your kids start asking tough questions about faith, be ready with answers, but also be okay with saying, "I don't know."
