

Love in the New Testament

- Eros (used 0x in NT) physical or romantic love
- Storge (used 0x in NT) family love/affection
- Phileo (used 55x in NT) affectionate love characteristic of friendship; warm and merited
- **Agape** (used 253x in NT) unmerited selfgiving love; seeks the good of another regardless of cost to self and regardless of worthiness of the other



Love in the New Testament

• Seen most clearly in Incarnation and Crucifixion of Jesus: This is love: not that we loved God, but He loved us and sent His Son as an atoning sacrifice for our sins – 1John 4.10.

Two distinctive elements of NT love:

- **Self-giving:** This is how we know what love is: Jesus Christ laid down His life for us 1John 3.16.
- **Gracious:** God demonstrates His own love for us in this: While we were still sinners, Christ died for us Romans 5.8.



Love of God

Obedience is evidence of love

- **1 John 5.3:** this is love for God: to keep His commands
- John 14.15: If you love Me, keep My commands.

Commands – follow Jesus and love people, particularly fellow Christians

- **1John 3.23:** And this is His command: to believe in the name of His Son, Jesus Christ, and to love one another as He commanded us.
- **John 15.12**: My command is this: love each other as I have loved you.



Love of Others

- In general: To seek the good (welfare) of others regardless of the cost to self and regardless of the worthiness of the other
- In specifics, requires discernment:
 - Who is our neighbor? From the Good Samaritan - our neighbor is anyone we come across in need
 - How to love our neighbor in a world where everyone is (potentially) our neighbor???
 - What is 'need?'
 - What is 'the good?'



Love of Others

- Simple framework:
- Ask God to give you eyes to see need around you
- When you see need ask God what love looks like in that particular instance, keeping in mind:
 - love is gracious focused on the good of the other regardless of their merit
 - love is self-giving focused on the good of the other even if it costs us something personally



Holy Spirit, search me and know me. Show me any places in my heart where I am loving the world or the things of the world.

- Lust of the flesh cravings of our sinful nature
- Lust of the eyes coveting what we see
- Pride of life boasting (internally or externally) in what we have (possessions) and what we do (achievements)

- 1John 2.15-16



God, I pray that out of Your glorious riches
You may strengthen me with power through
Your Holy Spirit in my inner being — in my
heart, in my mind, and in my soul, so that
Jesus may dwell in my heart through faith.
